



What is a school street?

School Streets are a Sheffield City Council led road safety initiative where the road outside a school is closed to all unauthorised vehicles at the beginning and end of the school day.

Why do we have a school street?

School Streets are put in place to help keep children safe as they arrive and leave school. They aim to do this by reducing the number of parked and moving vehicles in the busy areas around the school entrance.

What does our school street look like?

The School Street entrance is marked by signs stating pedestrian and cycle zone including the times of the closure, a bright blue strip across the highway, planters and a physical barrier marshalled by authorised staff.

Where is our school street?

Tullibardine Road from its junction with Greystones Road to Huntingtower Road.

When is the road closed?

8:15 to 9:15am and 2:45 to 3:45pm.



What is an authorised vehicle?

Emergency services, Blue Badge holders, taxis for residents and SCC school contracts only, residents with permits, deliveries, and health visitors.

Is it legal?

Yes. The School Street is covered by a Traffic Regulation Order. Unauthorised vehicles passing through the signs during the closure are breaking the law. More details can be found here at www.sheffield.gov.uk/sites/default/files/2023-02/School%20Streets%202023%20-%20Made.pdf

Who are the marshals and why are they there?

School Street marshals are school staff and volunteers who give up their time to help keep the area safe for you and your children. They are a visual reminder of the legal order in place. Please treat them with courtesy and respect.



If you have a permit or a blue badge please make it easily visible for the marshals to see.

If you are NOT an authorised vehicle, please do not approach the closure point as it creates problems for everyone.
